In addition, a The Smith-Rivers-Downing-Ford-Abraham-Hilaire Emerging Research Scholars Panel is being added to this national conference. The Medical University of South Carolina embarked on a university-wide Diversity and Inclusion Strategic Plan in 2015. One of the major initiatives of this Plan was around Education and Training. Dr. Arnold Alier (Alier Martinez in the Latinx community) is the current Director of the Bureau of Public Health Preparedness for the Department of Health and Environment Control (DHEC). He is a past Director of the DHEC Division EMS and has been with DHEC since 2013. He has over 35 years of experience as a paramedic. He holds an Associate of Science Degree in EMS, a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Religion, and a Master and Doctoral Degrees in Education. He has taught in several EMT and paramedic programs in the Upstate of South Carolina and does EMS content writing for HealthStream online CME platform. He was a guest speaker at the International Allied Health Conference in Lima, Peru held at the Cayetano Heredia Medical University.

While at DHEC he developed Narcan training for the law enforcement officers and firefighters. He also started an EMS outreach program called COPE to follow up individuals that have recently overdosed on opioids and were rescued with Narcan. Dr. Alier serves on several opioid crisis committees including the South Carolina Governor's Opioid Emergency Response Taskforce and the National Association of State EMS Official's Opioid Crisis Committee. In March 2022 he testified before a U.S. Congressional hearing on the challenges of the opioid epidemic.

During the Covid-19 pandemic he trained and led testing and vaccination strike teams throughout South Carolina focusing on the underserved Latin-X communities. He has been a spokesman to the Spanish-speaking communities in South Carolina about Covid-19. He is one of the panelists on an upcoming National PBS special this fall on the disparities experienced by the communities of color during the Covid-19 pandemic.

When not working, he enjoys growing coffee, citrus trees, and Carolina Reaper peppers. He has been playing the bass clarinet since high school with various bands, orchestras, and chamber groups. But enjoys the most being called Papa by his 11 grandchildren.

Dr. Oluwole Ariyo

Dean, Division of Mathematics and Natural Sciences; Associate Professor, Cell and Molecular Biology; Principal Investigator, Environmental Justice Institute, Allen University, Columbia, SC

Dr. Oluwole Ariyo, an Associate Professor of Biology (Tenured) is the Dean of Mathematics and Natural Sciences and Director/Principal Investigator, Environmental Justice Institute at Allen University. He joined Allen University in 2006 and served as Chair, Division of Mathematics and Natural Sciences between 2009 and 2011. Prior to that, he was the Biology Coordinator for two years (2007 - 2009). He later became the Chair, Allen University Curriculum Committee (2009 – 2017) and the Lead person for Institutional Review Board (2010 - 2022). His current research focuses on investigating and bringing solutions to the deleterious effects of different kinds of pollutants in different communities, especially distressed communities. Another aspect of his research deals with the expression patterns of microRNAs under different stress conditions and developmental stages in rice, corn, and wheat. Dr. Ariyo has mentored over 200 undergraduate students in research across the nation. One of his research presentations with a student on Nitrogen Oxide concentrations within the United States was presented at the National Environmental Justice (NEJ) Conference, which was held in Washington DC, March 2016. Subsequently, several presentations and trainings were presented annually at the same conference on effects of environmental pollutants. His training workshop on; 'Deleterious Effects of improper disposal of Household Hazardous Waste' was presented in 2019 at the same NEJ conference. He has been a Principal Investigator on many grants. Therefore, he has a wealth of experience when it comes to grant writing. He is also a member of the Project Management Institute (PMI). Dr. Ariyo loves to sing and play guitar. He believes strongly that integrating research and hands-on activities into teaching is a pragmatic approach to ensure significant students learning outcomes and skills acquisition.

Dr. Linda J. Bell, MD

South Carolina State Epidemiologist Director, Bureau of Communicable Disease Prevention and Control, Public Health SC Department of Health and Environmental Control Columbia, SC

Dr. Linda Bell trained in internal medicine at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School followed by training as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Dr. Bell has spent her nearly 30-year public health career with the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) serving in various positions primarily focusing on prevention, control and response to infectious diseases. She is currently the Director of the DHEC Bureau of Communicable Disease Prevention and Control and the South Carolina State Epidemiologist. In that role she is responsible for oversight for the agency's programs for Acute Disease Epidemiology; STD/HIV & Viral Hepatitis; Immunizations; and Tuberculosis Control. In her work Dr. Bell has endeavored to draw attention to addressing social determinants of health in public health interventions with the ultimate goal of reducing health disparities. Dr. Bell has served on the board of trustees for EdVenture Children's Museum, Healthy Learners, Heathwood Hall Episcopal School, and Francis Burns United Methodist Church, and is an active member in several community organizations.

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DR. THADDEUS J. BELL, MD

Physician, Closing the Gap in Healthcare, Inc.

North Charleston, SC

Dr. Thaddeus John Bell was born on May 17, 1944, in Columbia, SC. In his early career he was a schoolteacher in Gaffney, South Carolina where he was the first African American to teach in an all-white high school in South Carolina. While he was a student at South Carolina State College, he was selected to be a park ranger in Yosemite National Park making him one of the first African Americans to be selected by the National Park Service, Department of Interior. He worked there during the summer months from 1964 to1967. He later moved to Charleston, SC where he taught at Charleston High School and St Andrews High School. He attributes his experience as a teacher being very instrumental in his ability to explain difficult information to people with ease.

Dr. Bell is a graduate of South Carolina State University, a historically black university, and of the Medical University of South Carolina in Charleston (1976). He has been designated as a distinguish graduate from both institutions. He is also a graduate of Atlanta University Graduate School with a master's degree in Science Education and of the School of Aerospace Medicine San Antonio, Texas as a certified Fight Surgeon (US Air Force).

In 1980, Dr. Bell cofounded the Elijah Wright Cross-Family Health Center, a free clinic for the underserved people in the rural community of Cross, SC, where he was the only physician in the town for 10 years. With Dr. Bell assistance, the Cross Health Center is now a part of the federally funded Franklin C. Fetter Health Network. Dr Bell was an attending staff physician at the Ralph Johnson Veteran Hospital in Charleston, where he worked for 6 years as a medical consultant on the Alcohol, Drugs, and Mental Health Unit before entering private practice in Family Medicine. While in private practice, Dr. Bell has also served as a medical consultant to the Charleston and Berkeley County Jails, as well as the Medical Director of Fenwick Hall Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Center. He has also served as a sports medicine consultant to the US Olympic Committee at the Olympic training center in Denver, CO.

In memory of his son, Thaddeus John Bell II, Dr Bell started the Bell & Schlau Track and Field Seminar for children of the Low Country in collaboration with Charleston Southern University for 20 years which children were taught the fundamentals of track & field. The students gained exposure to world class athletes during their visits to Charleston to participate in the seminar, which was recognized as one the best in the state of South Carolina by the Governor. This led to Dr. Bell's selecting as Chairmen of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness for three different administrations.

In 1993, Dr. Bell joined the faculty of MUSC, serving as Associate Dean for Minority Affairs in the College of Medicine for 17 years (1993-2010). Dr. James B Edwards (President of MUSC) appointed Dr. Bell as Director of the University's Office of Diversity in 1996, a position he held until 2004. In those positions, he created programs to improve the recruitment, retention, and graduation rates of African American students at MUSC. During his tenure at MUSC, Dr. Bell founded the prestigious Dr Earl B. Higgins Award and Scholarship, presented annually to the person and student who represents the best virtues of diversity at MUSC. Also, during his tenure, all six colleges at MUSC underwent diversity training, slowly improving enrollment of women and African Americans students. The greatest improvement was shown in the College of Medicine, where Dr. Bell served as Associate Dean for Diversity under Dr. Layton McCurdy. He served on the Admission & Progress Committees and was a member of the distinguished President Council.

Dr. Bell's tenure at MUSC as a student, faculty member and administrator shined the light on disparities in health at MUSC, within the state of South Carolina, and the overall nation. These disparities became increasingly apparent as Dr. Bell experience in the field of medicine throughout his career.

In 2005, Dr. Bell attended the NMA Annual Convention & Scientific Assembly, focused on health disparities. One of the presenters suggested that black physicians should become more involved in their communities to help decrease the myths and mistrust of the health care system that was widespread among African Americans.

Dr. Bell was inspired to address health disparities in South Carolina and focuses on health literacy in the black community. To that end, he founded Closing the Gap in Healthcare Inc (CTGIHC), which is a non-profit organization aimed at decreasing health disparities by providing health education for African Americans and other underserved populations. The organization accomplishes its mission by addressing the health issues of African Americans through health seminars, lectures, barber and beauty shops, virtual conferences, health fairs, and health tips distributed through various communication channels (radio, television, and social media) reaching over 300,000 people each week.

Closing the Gap in Health Care Inc is the parent organization for Thaddeus John Bell Endowed Scholarship for African American Students at MUSC through the Community Foundation of Charleston and has an endowed scholarship which will be given to student in perpetuity. This scholarship is already assisting African Americans students in the health care professions. The Low Country Jazz Festival helps to raise funds for the scholarship, and in 2012, this event was voted one of the top twenty festivals in the South.

Dr. Bell is currently practicing Family Medicine serving patients in his private practice for over 40 years. He has become known as a community and statewide leader in medicine, as well as an elite athlete at the international master's level. He was voted one of SC's Top 100 Athletes of the 20th Century.

Dr. Bell is a member of Olive Branch AME Church, Mt. Pleasant, SC. He is the father of Thaddeus J. Bell, II (deceased), Tiffany J. Bell, Tonisha Bell-Alston (deceased) and is the grandfather of a granddaughter, Julia Alston, grandsons, Kaidyn Thaddeus Snipe and Edmond James Alston. He is married to Cynthia Alston Bell.

By starting a youth development program in 2001, Lorenzo provides workshops, training and consultation in school districts throughout NYC. Mr. Steele targets trouble youth who are in need of awareness about the criminal justice system and its harsh realities. Exclusive experience and visual effect has allowed Mr. Steele to work as a New York City Board of Education vendor where he assists schools with conflict resolution, gang/gun awareness, bullying, and literacy training workshops. The program was designed to reduce incidents and to induce consequential thinking.

Lorenzo has worked with District Attorneys offices in Brooklyn/ Queens and Nassau Long Island providing gang and prison awareness to at-risk youth in schools and communities.
